The City of Morganton is excited to welcome lessie Parris as its new Finance Director. Parris comes to the City from the civil engineering company WithersRavenel, where she worked most recently as a Finance Manager. She will begin her new role with the City on December 30.

Parris offers the City a breadth of financial experience in both the private and public sectors. She has served as the Finance Director for the Town of Rutherfordton, and worked for auditing firms Deloitte & Touche, LLP and KPMG in Charlotte. Parris earned her Master's in Accountancy from Wake Forest University, and her Bachelor's in Accountancy from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. She is a Certified Public Accountant.

She said she has always been drawn to a career in government finance.

"My father was a CPA, and did governmental auditing for more than 20 years," Parris said. "I grew up around the government finance world and loved it, and always wanted to work in finance when I grew up."

2020 Census begins this Spring

The United States Census is coming up, and participating in the census is your chance to make sure everyone in Morganton and Burke County is counted.

The census is about more than simply counting the population of an area.

The census provides critical data for Morganton and Burke County that lawmakers, business owners, teachers, and many others use to provide services, funding, and support for the community. Census data is responsible for determining how more than \$675 billion in federal funding is allocated across the nation each year. When everyone participates, it is more likely our area will receive its fair share



of those funds. Receiving these funds helps local government to continue to improve the quality of

Each home will receive an invitation to respond to a short questionnaire. You can complete the questionnaire online, by phone, or by mail. Most households will receive invitations in the mail in March 2020.

There are a few important things to note about the census:


- It's easy to participate. The Census can be completed by mail, over the phone, or online. There are 9 questions about how many people live at the location, their ages, relationship to others living in the household, and race.
- It's safe and secure. The Census Bureau is required by law to protect any personal information and keep

it strictly confidential.
Answers will be used only to produce statistics and cannot be used for law enforcement purposes, including Immigration and Customers
Enforcement (ICE).
There are no questions about citizenship status or requesting a Social Security Number.

- Everyone counts. The

Census counts all residents not voters, not citizens. but anyone who is living in the United States. An accurate count of anyone living in Morganton and Burke County as of April 1, 2020 is the goal. It is important to make sure everyone gets counted so that we get proper amounts of funding and representation in Congress.

Follow these tips to save on your utility bills

Winter is here, but your utility bill doesn't have to send a shiver down your spine. There are several simple tips you can follow that will help you save money during the colder months. Check out some tips from ElectriCities of North Carolina below that will help you beat the winter blues and warm up to savings:

- 68 is the magic number. Set your thermostat to 68 degrees or lower when heating your home. Every degree above 68 can increase your bill by a whopping 3-5 percent!

- Set it and forget it. Take advantage of programmable thermostats. Especially if you have a furnace, set your thermostat to automatically turn the heat down at night and when you're away.
- Small isn't always mighty. Despite what you might think, space heaters use a lot of energy and can increase your monthly bill. If you have energy efficient central heating in your home, use that instead.

- Don't forget your maintenance. There are three things to remember regularly. When your fireplace is not in use, make sure your damper is closed;

check or replace filters once a month; and clean air registers, baseboard heaters, and radiators, and be sure they aren't blocked.

- Hello, sunshine! Besides providing Vitamin D, sunlight helps heat your home for free. Open drapes and let the sun stream in.
